Our Story

There are thousands of stray animals in Sri Lanka suffering from horrific injuries, malnutrition and disease. Dogs and cats with fractured spines, severed limbs and maggot infested wounds; pups and kittens living on festering rubbish dumps; animals slowly dying of tick fever, womb infections and bleeding tumours-suffering in agony until they die. With the risk and associated fear of rabies, strays are often demonised, leading to cruelty at the hands of humans. This ocean of suffering and misery is heart breaking for any animal lover to witness, let alone walk away from. Animal SOS Sri Lanka, a UK registered charity, was founded on the vision of Kim Cooling who, after witnessing the appalling plight of animals there, particularly the strays, decided to take action to help them. With a distinct lack of safe havens and veterinary care available to strays in Sri Lanka, our work and facilities are a lifeline to many otherwise doomed animals.



OUR ACHIEVEMENTS (JANUARY-DECEMBER 2018)

- We provided over 19,000 treatments for diseases, wounds, fractures and tumours
- We sterilized 1356 dogs and cats and conducted 450 other surgeries
- We conducted over 7000 bloods tests-smears/chemistry/ haematology
- We provided over 7000 vaccinations against rabies and other dangerous viruses
- We provided over 16,000 antiparasitic treatments (worming, mange, tick, flea treatments)
- We are currently caring for 1413 dogs and 65 cats at the sanctuary
- We feed over 1600 cats and dogs EVERY day (sanctuary animals and hungry strays in the area)
- We are operational EVERY day of the year







Pedigree dogs are often status symbols in Sri Lanka, but the reality is that many pedigree breeds suffer terribly just like the strays due to ignorance and neglect. We don't know the full history of Cindy, an owned Great Dane pup, around 9 months old but we were recently alerted to her fading away at a veterinary practice and, as a last ditch attempt to save her life, were requested to help her. We agreed and were shocked by her state. She was skeletal, immobile with huge and very deep pressure wounds. She weighed only 17.7kg. In the few weeks we have had her, she has improved significantly.





She has gained weight (now 28 kg) her huge pressure wounds are healing and she is now walking. The best news of all is that a supporter from the UK has fallen in love with her. He plans to fund all the costs to adopt her in the UK once she is fully recovered and all the formalities are done. What a lucky girl to have a second chance like this.

MIRACLES AT THE SANCTUARY

BEAUTY Be a u t y is one of the worst cases we have taken in. She was collapsed with the most horrific facial wound, her eye was prolapsed, lower jaw fractured and she was dehydrated and had blood parasite disease as well. But, we gave her a chance and, with surgery and loving care, we pulled her through. Just look at the transformation of this beautiful happy dog!



CONNTE a r r i v e d in a coma after a road traffic accident. She had brain damage and a dangerous tick borne disease called babesia. Again, we gave her a chance and she came out of her coma and is now happily running around the sanctuary.









This tiny 1 month old pup was hit by a vehicle and arrived with a fractured jaw and in a coma. He recovered because we gave him a chance.







We get visitors from all over the world visiting our sanctuary. Sri Lanka is now a top holiday destination, so many tourists are flocking to the island. Many visitors are sensitive to animal suffering and are relieved



to find a project likes ours for the suffering strays. Many animal loving locals also visit the sanctuary and bring supplies of rice and other much needed items. The dogs and cate are always bappy to see them all

and cats are always happy to see them all.











A HAPPY ENDING FOR MANU!

We rescued this very sweet boy because he had multiple TVT's (transmissible venereal tumours) He had tumours in his eye, penis and mouth and had suffered immensely. TVT's are sexually transmitted cancers spread via mating. ManU responded well to his treatments administered by our experienced and dedicated team. The treatment for TVT's is chemotherapy- Vincristine, and regular blood checks are important during chemo sessions (like with humans) to ensure the blood count is ok. Chemo causes anaemia but the added complication in Sri Lanka is that many dogs also suffer from blood parasite diseases like babesia. These blood parasites destroy vital blood cells too, causing severe anaemia, so we blood test each dog when admitted to the sanctuary to promptly diagnose and treat these diseases. ManU recovered well and those painful tumours are no more. Once fully recovered, we vaccinated and neutered him and then found the most incredible home by the seaside for him to live out his days.







DANA

She was rescued from Galle and had a huge tumour which was successfully removed.



ALEXI

This tiny pup was delivered to the sanctuary collapsed and dying from babesia, a tick borne disease that causes severe anaemia. She weighed just 0.8kg. We battled to save her life and she survived.









PETER PAN

A village dog slashed simply because he chewed some clothes. The life threatening wound was crawling with zillions of maggots, but we rescued him just in time and the wound has healed nicely and he is now safe at the sanctuary.









MAVADO

Collapsed and literally being eaten alive by maggots. We saved his life and nursed him back to health.

Outreach Programs

feeding 1600 Cats and Dogs a Day

Would you consider helping towards our daily feeding costs? We are currently using 250 kilos of rice, 200 kilos of

fish, 120 kilos of vegetables plus complete dry biscuits and 4 boxes of





dry biscuits and 4 boxes of tinned fish per day. The cost to the charity is around £380 a day, so that is over £11,400 a month. Our feeding program also includes starving street animals that patiently wait for their only daily meal. Our rescues deserve a good nutritional diet and this helps tmany of them to pull through from their critical conditions. Please help if you can.



URGENT APPEAL FOR FUNDS

We desperately need funds to continue our life saving work. We give a second chance to so many otherwise doomed animals. Our vital outreach programs where we neuter/treat/vaccinate against the deadly rabies virus, help so many animals in need and humans too. We are still taking in very critical cases that would die without our input. Donations directly SAVE and TRANSFORM lives with our charity and they also transform communities too, making rabies a risk of the past, helping the life chances of children through education which in turn promotes compassion to animals and hope for a better future. Remember, with our charity, donations go directly to the animals as we all volunteer our time for free here in the UK. Our running costs are currently around £30,000 a month now. This is a huge amount for a small charity.

Your donations can help us in many ways:

- Fund our weekly neutering and rabies vaccinations outreach programs that benefit so many animals and humans, reducing animal suffering and unwanted litters. The cost of a daily outreach program is approximately £400 and covers vet fees, medications/treatments and educational materials.
- Fund the daily care of animals living at the sanctuary. The costs of medications, veterinary care, monthly anti-parasite treatments, vaccinations and care staff at the sanctuary.
- Fund our vital feeding programs around 1600 cats and dogs fed EVERY day the sanctuary animals and starving strays in the area that wait patiently for their only daily meal.
