Our Story

There are thousands of stray animals in Sri Lanka suffering from horrific injuries, malnutrition and disease. Dogs and cats with fractured spines, severed limbs and maggot infested wounds; pups and kittens living on festering rubbish dumps; animals slowly dying of tick fever, womb infections and bleeding tumours, suffering in agony until they die. With the risk and associated fear of rabies, strays are often demonised, leading to cruelty at the hands of humans. This ocean of suffering and misery is heart breaking for any animal lover to witness, let alone walk away from. Animal SOS Sri Lanka, a UK registered charity, was founded on the vision of Kim Cooling who, after witnessing the appalling plight of animals there, particularly the strays, decided to take action to help them. With a distinct lack of safe havens and veterinary care available to strays in Sri Lanka, our work and facilities are a lifeline to many otherwise doomed animals.



OUR ACHIEVEMENTS JANUARY - JUNE 2021

-  **We are currently caring for 1866 dogs and 54 cats at the sanctuary**
-  **We provided over 9,000 treatments for disease, wounds, fractures and tumours**
-  **We sterilized 250 dogs and cats and conducted 95 other surgeries**
-  **We provided 4500 blood tests/smears/chemistry/haematology**
-  **We provided over 5000 anti-parasitic treatments (worming, tick/flea treatments)**
-  **We provided over 4700 vaccinations against rabies and other deadly viruses**
-  **We feed around 2250 cats and dogs EVERY day (sanctuary animals and hungry strays in the area) and operate the largest feeding program in Sri Lanka**
-  **We are operational EVERY day of the year**

DAFFODIL FINALLY FOUND HER FOREVER HOME!

Her owner died, she was on the streets looking for love, but was being beaten and her leg was injured. We took her in, nursed her back to health and then found the perfect home for her.



THE LARGEST FEEDING PROGRAM IN SRI LANKA

We cook nearly 1 tonne of food EVERY day to feed our Sanctuary Animals and hungry strays in the area. The food consists of rice, fish, chicken, dhal and vegetables. We are currently feeding around 2250 dogs and cats a day.

We freshly cook the food in 2 kitchens with 2 teams of staff- it's a herculean task!

New critical arrivals/disabled dogs/pups/cats/kittens all have extra meals.

We purchase dried/wet/cat & dog food in addition for extra feeding.

We spend around 50% of our monthly running costs on food. That is around £825 per day for feeding these animals. That's £24,750 a month! (36 pence per to feed 1 animal a day)

This is why we need YOUR help to keep their stomachs full.



CAT STORIES



We are currently caring for 54 cats at the sanctuary and also take in dire emergencies too. These are some of the recent emergency cases.

KOGGALA MUMMY CAT

This was a true horror case. An owned cat had difficulty giving birth. One kitten was born dead and the next kitten remained stuck in the birth canal for hours. A local vet was unhelpful and due to Covid restrictions, travel to us was problematic. The stuck kitten was eventually expelled and the next day the cat had surgery to remove 2 further dead kittens. However, the surgery conducted by a local vet was substandard. The wound site was not shaved, nylon sutures were used that are not dissolvable and the

wound got badly infected. We stepped in and had to operate on the cat to save her life. There was a bowel loop that had herniated into the subcutaneous space with adhesions and abscesses. We cleared up what we could and sutured her with absorbable sutures, placed her on IV fluids/antibiotics/pain relief and hoped for the best. The wound healed quickly and the cat made a full recovery after her near brush with death. The owners were so grateful.



PUTHA

It was alleged that this owned cat was badly beaten by a neighbour. We nursed him back to health, castrated

and vaccinated him and then had to find a new home for him as his original owners feared for his safety if returned.

TIGER LILY

Tiger Lily was admitted to us earlier in the year with a horrible, maggot infested wound in her mouth. We healed the wound, nursed her back to health, vaccinated her and returned her to her guardians.



NEUTERING DAY AT THE SANCTUARY

Due to Covid restrictions in Sri Lanka, our community outreach programs have been curtailed during the last 12 months. However, we continue neutering at the sanctuary. Neutering is key in alleviating animal suffering and reducing unwanted litters.

SOME OF THE LIVES SAVED AND TRANSFORMED

MALSONIC Malsonic had a humongous tumour weighing 15 Kilos, hanging from his neck. He also had babesia (tick-borne disease) We successfully removed the tumour, treated his babesia, and he made a full recovery.



APPU



APPU Appu arrived with an infected nasal TVT (transmissible venereal tumour) tick fever and a corneal ulcer. We nursed him back to health

DIXIE Dixie was run over as a tiny pup and arrived at the sanctuary with a serious brain injury. She fully recovered under our care.

RUSARA An older dog, she arrived at death's door; starved, hairless, suffering from maggot wounds but we pulled her back from the brink and she remains at the sanctuary

ELIE He arrived in a horrible state-hairless, maggot infested wounds and severe anaemia from blood parasite disease, but we pulled him through.


Another tiny pup run over and arrived at the sanctuary in a coma. She made a full recovery.

Fighting Mother Nature as well as all the other challenges we face, is daunting to say the least but we battle on regardless because these animals need us. We do require a lot more shelter areas at the sanctuary as well as more wooden kennels for our dogs. Any donations to help towards this would be hugely appreciated.

THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH

Life is extremely fragile for street animals in Sri Lanka but for some pets like Cindy, a Great Dane, the suffering is just as bad. Cindy was almost lifeless when we took her in. She was just skin and bones, had huge pressure wounds and could barely lift her head. We battled to save her life, something we do 365 days a year at our sanctuary in Sri Lanka. Cindy survived along with 1000s of other dogs and cats that we have nursed back to health from the brink.

Animal SOS Sri Lanka is a UK Registered Charity, dedicated to alleviating the widespread suffering of dogs and cats in Sri Lanka. We provide veterinary care, free neutering and vaccination programs, adoption schemes and animal welfare education. We are currently caring for over 1600 rescues at our sanctuary and in desperate need of donations to continue our vital work.
